St. David's Episcopal Church has been serving the people of Metro Detroit since March 2, 1952.

Parishioners support local food pantry programs, serve meals at Crossroads Soup Kitchen in Detroit, send medical personnel and aid each year to Haiti, mentor students at nearby Vandenberg World Cultures Academy, visit residents of St. Anne's Mead Senior Community, host homeless guests each spring through the South Oakland Shelter (SOS), serve each summer as home base for the End Homelessness Now race to benefit SOS, visit the guests at Detroit Rescue Mission, and grow a community garden that donates produce to local food pantries.

Sunday services are held at 8 and 10 a.m. All are welcome.
